Letter from the Board President

Preschool Partners continues to excel in its mission "to provide an inclusive and diverse learning environment that prepares preschool children and their families for success," and the 2022-2023 school year was no exception. Through robust curriculum, devoted teachers and staff, and deep partnerships with our families and our community, we were able to exceed benchmarks in both early childhood education metrics and fundraising goals:

- -Ninety-seven percent (yes, 97%!) of our graduating preschoolers tested ready for kindergarten, tangible evidence that our program is thriving.
- -Over the course of the school year, we gave out more than 2,240 books to our families.
- -To strengthen parent involvement, this year we added special Parent Roundtables facilitated by the McWane Science Center, hosted an inaugural Thanksgiving Parade, and continued our annual "Show Me the Love" family read-a-thon.
- -Fundraising efforts included our most successful Partners & Promises event, raising over \$150,000, as well as an inaugural "Party on the Lawn" family night in the Spring and a new trivia event launched by our Young Partners Board.

As the outgoing President of the Board of Directors, I am happy to report on these and other statistics and achievements, but as a parent of a current PSP student, I know that these metrics mean so much more. I've seen firsthand the positive effects that PreSchool Partners has on the academic, social, and emotional development of each child and the way in which that development extends beyond the classroom to positively influence the lives of our teachers, staff, families, and community partners. As Ruby Felton, a frequent speaker at our Monday parent meeting, is quoted as saying, "it is important that we plant positive seeds in the lives of our children," and I am grateful that PreSchool Partners not only plants those positive seeds but also nurtures and encourages them to grow.

Thank you for your continued partnership with PreSchool Partners this year; may the seeds we plant today become the fruitful trees of tomorrow.

Our Mission and Program

Founded in 1995, PreSchool Partners created a multigenerational program to address three key social problems:

- affordable childcare for families that need it most and can afford it least
- ensuring that children have the tools needed for school readiness
- the importance of parental involvement for children's success in school

PSP provides affordable, quality early education and parental support for low-income families who need it most to positively impact our children's futures in education and beyond. Preschoolers learn academic and social/emotional skills in a structured and nurturing learning environment during one of the most critical stages of development. Parents receive training, support, and connection to community resources to promote child and family well-being. Our teachers, parents, and staff partner together to improve student outcomes and in turn create lasting change in our community.

Classrooms with socioeconomic and racial diversity have been proven to result in stronger academic outcomes, increased language and vocabulary skills, and promote respect for different backgrounds. In 2017, PSP began offering a limited number of full tuition spots (no more than 35%), making diverse classrooms possible. The demand for diversity in Birmingham is growing, but it's often not easy to find; we're proud to be bridging communities.



PreSchool Partners' mission is to provide an inclusive and diverse learning environment that prepares preschool children and their families for success through high-quality curriculum, nurturing educators, parental engagement and community collaboration.

Children's Program

We provide a highly-structured learning environment for two, three, and four-yearolds focused on school readiness and success beyond the classroom. Our students engage in activities that teach number, letter, shape, and color recognition, rhyming and beginning sounds. They also receive instruction in classroom behavior and social skills. We have two highly qualified teachers in every classroom, and classes are kept small. ensuring every child receives individualized attention.

In addition to academic skills, our teachers know that social and emotional skills are vital to ensuring a successful start in kindergarten. The PreSchool Partners curriculum includes the PATHS model for teaching children to understand their feelings, manage emotions, and resolve conflicts.



Enrichment Coordinator, Loretta Keller, leads the PATHS curriculum with Twiggle the Turtle and friends. The 2022-23 school year marked PSP's fifth year of implementing PATHS.



PATHS <u>Promoting Alternative</u> <u>TH</u>inking <u>Strategies</u>

- Increases self-control through understanding emotions
- Increases ability to get along with others while improving friendship skills
- Enhances self-esteem, selfconfidence, and ability to give and receive compliments
- Increases understanding of vocabulary necessary to express feelings to others
- Teaches children to understand how their behavior affects others

Our program also incorporates enrichment activities that are included for all students to broaden horizons and make connections to complement academic units. These activities include library visits, music and theatre, movement activities, sports, and field trips. Our teachers are passionate about what they do and are always incorporating creative activities to fully immerse children in learning through positive, fun experiences. All children receive health screenings to promote early intervention, and speech therapy sessions are provided on-site at no cost to families.

Parent Program

What sets us apart from other programs is our emphasis and inclusion of parental involvement in a child's education. PSP has always taken a two-generational approach to education by providing learning opportunities that address and support the needs of children and their caregivers. PSP families commit to attending school one morning a week during the school year. Parents gain access to parenting and community resources, social support-building activities, and opportunities to engage with their children to build stronger relationships. Group sessions feature professional speakers on topics including child development, nutrition, mental health, money management, positive discipline, and the importance of early education.

Families Reading Together

Another cornerstone of our approach is our family literacy program, Families Reading Together. Parents are given a children's book each week to build a home library for their family and promote reading with their child. Parents read the book along with a trained instructor and discuss different ways to engage their children in reading. At home, the parents and children read the book together and complete homework activities. Both parents and children agreed that their favorite book from this year's program was Pete the Cat and the Perfect Pizza Party by Kimberly and James Dean.

The Parent Program of PreSchool Partners is one of my favorite aspects of our school! Parenting is the hardest job there is and all parents can benefit from the support and resources we provide. Our parents tell us that the speakers in the program provide them with valuable information that help them better understand and connect with their children. It also helps our parents feel less alone in the struggles that come with caring for young children. We love being partners with our parents and working together to support not only the needs of their little ones, but the parents as well.

Results and Impact

Our program has a proven achievement rate of preparing children for success in kindergarten and equipping parents with the tools needed to support their child's education. Students are evaluated at the beginning and end of each year by our Program Director based on academic, social, and emotional benchmarks of development and skills required to progress in school.

PSP has maintained our four-star rating received in May 2022 from the Alabama Quality Stars Program.



Our Executive Director, Lella Hamiter, attended the Alabama Quality Stars Celebration hosted by the United Way of Central Alabama. The event honored early education centers that are rated by the STARS Program, a quality scale aimed to improve education for our state's youngest students.

Programs are rated on excellence in areas of staff qualifications and professional development, management and administrative practices, learning environment and curriculum, and family involvement and community partnerships.

We have a five year partnership with The University of Alabama to collect data from current and past PreSchool Partners students in order to further measure the success of our program. We are working with their researchers to define metrics to measure the success of our parent program as well. The end goal is to collect enough information to transform our program from evidence informed to evidence based.

Student Spotlight: Emmanuel

Emmanuel started the school year as a quiet and apprehensive little boy, hiding behind his mother when she brought him in and sometimes tearful. Being the only Spanish-speaking child in the class, beginning a new school was a scary and daunting experience. Emmanuel's parents were apprehensive as well, worrying about his well-being in the hands of others and trusting his teachers to care for and educate their child.

Emmanuel knew very few words in English and had to begin learning a new language, as well as mastering kindergarten readiness skills. His knowledge of the alphabet, numbers, and shapes was very limited as well, but as the weeks progressed, his confidence grew.

His teachers noticed he was gradually speaking more and repeating many of the words used in the classroom. Ms. Leslie and Ms. Millie were excited to see him expand his vocabulary in such a short amount of time. As Emmanuel became more comfortable and trusting of his teachers, he began to thrive.

His teachers' relationship with his parents also made huge strides. It became apparent how happy and appreciative they were that their son was progressing. Ms. Leslie and Ms. Millie encouraged

them to practice speaking English together and sent activities home so they could help reinforce skills with Emmanuel.

By the spring, Emmanuel's progress was astounding. He was mastering his letters and sounds, understanding numbers, number concepts, and shapes, and developing critical thinking skills. His parents were so dedicated to being involved in his education they won the family award for parent participation. Emmanuel graduated in May and is ready to take on Kindergarten at Helena Elementary in the fall.

Student Spotlight: Charlotte

The Baskins first learned about PreSchool Partners when staff from The LoveLady Center came to observe PSP's early education program. Carrie Baskin, a LoveLady employee, was so impressed she asked to enroll her daughter on the spot. Charlotte had never been to school before, but her parents knew they wanted her to get the start she needed to succeed when she began kindergarten.

Despite her inexperience in a classroom environment, Charlotte adapted to school and began to thrive in her new routines. She learned to follow instructions from her teachers and found new activities she enjoyed with friends. Her teachers, Ms. Leslie and Ms. Millie, noticed her wonderful imagination as she played in the kitchen and created artwork. She was always very observant of her surroundings and loved listening to stories during circle time.

Academically, Charlotte made tremendous strides as well. When school began, she knew just her colors and shapes, but by graduation, she had mastered early literacy skills like identifying beginning sounds and rhyming words. She could write her name independently and made great progress with her letters and numbers. She also attended group speech therapy sessions at PSP and worked hard to master targeted sounds.




